O'Brien House recently established an Intensive Out Patient (IOP) Program which provides an alternative to traditional treatments. The IOP Program is a two (2) phase program which consists of the following:

Six (6) weeks of intensive treatment 3 times a week and twelve (12) weeks of continuing care once weekly utilizing the following:

Monday - Thursday	(3) 12 Step Meetings per week
Day Treatment	9:00 a.m. - 12:00 Noon
Night Treatment	6:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m.
